ADVISORY COUNCIL RECOMMENDATIONS & RESPONSES

A. Council's comments/recommendations from students' panel discussion:






ADMINISTRATION & SHARED GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE






ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

HIGHLIGHTS

- Despite Covid-19, CFWS increased undergraduate enrollment 8% from Fall 2020 levels from 457 to 493 students.
- Transitioned Michelle Cole to a Student Coordinator and a full-time SSO staff member to assist undergraduate education.
- Dedicated 2 PhD GTA's to assist faculty in the WLDE & WPVT undergraduate instruction.
- Initiated 5 new CFWS minors, Urban Forestry, Coastal Management, Forest Health, Forest Seedling Nursery Management and Environmental Law as options for NATR and AU students.
- Finished the Forest Business and Investment Online MS degree. Approved by AU BOT and ACHE with a Spring 2022 start.
- Annual undergraduate program review assessments were rated Mature Exemplary for all undergraduate degrees.
- Registered Forester Exam had 90% pass rate of graduating seniors in March 2021.
- Science of Nature I and II as well as Climate Science I and II were approved as AU Science Core Courses and offered for the first time Fall 2021.
- Spring 2021 undergraduates across all degree programs had 62% Success Rate (Employment or Education) at time of graduation; salaries ranged from \$43,000 - \$49,000, depending upon degree.








CONFERRED GRADUATE DEGREES & CERTIFICATES






CREDIT HOUR PRODUCTION FY14/15 - 20/21



ALABAMA COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SYSTEM

Participants in Auburn University's Alabama Extension Forestry, Wildlife and Natural Resources team programs report increased interactions with natural resource technical service providers (Extension, Forestry Commission, NRCS, and Registered Foresters) leading to the development of forestland management plans and better understanding of the resource which are shown to improve forest health, create and improve wildlife habitat, increase the quality and value of timber, and protect water quality. 
Based on an annual harvest volume of 40,177,166 tons and 2,091 PLM loggers, it is estimated that 2021 participants had a direct impact on 28% of the tons of wood harvested in Alabama.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Overall program attendance in 2021 was over 2,000 nearly double that of 2020
- Public school field trips are finally coming back this semester for the first time since the initial COVID shutdown
- 2nd year of Holiday Walk in the Woods was a huge success, with nearly double the attendance of previous year
- Huge demand for 2022 camps, filling over 200 registrations in the first day - nearly sold out in the first week
- Sensory Forest under development: accessible trail designed to engage the senses through nature
- Woodland Wonders in it's third year with as many on the waitlist as are enrolled - offering full-day classes for the 2022/23 school year and already sold out
- Successful prescribed burn on about 15 acres
- Planted approximately 1,000 short leaf pines




